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Summary

The Pedal with Pete Foundation had a mixed year in 2022, with improvements in some areas and disappointments in others. We executed successful ride events in Columbus, Ohio and Emmetsburg, Iowa, but we were not able to organize a ride in Northeast Ohio. We used the funds that were raised to support two research grants, through our cooperation with the [American Academy for Cerebral Palsy and Developmental Medicine](#). We also provided specially adapted bicycles to three children with Cerebral Palsy, through our cooperation with the [Adaptive Sports Connection](#). We are able to continue this work through the support we receive from our many dedicated donors, riders, sponsors and volunteers, many of whom have contributed for more than ten years. At the end of the year, we added two new members to our Board of Directors. One of the new Directors will focus on improving our social media presence and the other Director will work to increase our interaction with the cerebral palsy community in Central Ohio.

Introduction

The Pedal with Pete Foundation is a not-for-profit 501 c (3) organization with a mission to raise funds for research leading to better prevention strategies and treatment protocols to improve the quality of life of people who live with cerebral palsy, their families and caregivers. All of the work of the Foundation is carried out by volunteers, enabling over 80% of all funds raised to be directed towards the Foundation's research program. Each year the Foundation sponsors three cycling events in the Midwest to raise funds for its research program.

The Pedal with Pete Foundation was founded in Kent, OH in 1993 by Pete Zeidner. Although he had a serious case of cerebral palsy, he rode a recumbent bicycle with joy and purpose. He combined his love of cycling, his first-hand knowledge of cerebral palsy, and his marketing knowledge to conceive of a way to raise funds for cerebral palsy research. The Foundation moved from Kent to Columbus in 2010. The cumulative amount of money raised by the Foundation passed the million dollar level in 2015, and continues to grow.



The Foundation has been a consistent funding source of critical seed grants for cerebral palsy research. This reputation is the result of the hard work and support of the loyal volunteers, donors, and ride participants that make up the Pedal with Pete family.

Ride Events



For over twenty-five years the Pedal with Pete Foundation has sponsored annual cycling- oriented events to raise funds to support our program of research grants to medical researchers seeking a cure or treatment for cerebral palsy.

Columbus Ride Event:

The event team again chose the [Marysville High School](#) parking lot for this year's event, with rest stops in Milford Center and Mechanicsburg. In addition to the ride, the day's activities included a Kid's Fest sponsored by [Nationwide Children's Hospital](#) staff, and the presentation of specially adapted bicycles to three children with cerebral palsy, in cooperation with the [Adaptive Sports Connection](#). After the ride, participants enjoyed subs, pizza, chips, and root beer floats. Riders chose among 6 routes of distances from 12 to 101 miles. Riding from Marysville High School put our riders in the very scenic farmland of Central Ohio safely and quickly. The event, held on Saturday, July 30th, had 476 riders, and raised \$40,386. Research Program

Each spring the Foundation receives a number of research proposals from the American Academy of Cerebral Palsy and Developmental Medicine (AACPDMD). These proposals are reviewed by the Foundation's Cerebral Palsy Research Team, who make a recommendation to the Foundation's Board of Directors of which projects to fund. The final decision about which projects to fund is made by the Board in June or July. Each of the projects are funded at a level between \$20,000 and \$30,000. Most of these research projects are seed research projects which typically lead to follow-up projects for further research. Such funding is a scarce yet critical part of the overall research process.

Baseline Muscle Properties of individuals with Cerebral Palsy

Institution: Boston Children's Hospital

Abstract: Spastic muscles of individuals with CP are usually smaller, stiffer, and weaker. Recent research has shown that muscle preservation therapies and enhancement are important. Compare muscle quality before and after receiving Botox, Selective Dorsal Rhizotomies, orthopedic surgery, or no treatment.

Core Question: Do common interventions including surgery and Botox injections improve muscle quality more than physical therapies?



Development of a Clinical Prediction Model for Predicting Post-operative Complications in Children with Cerebral Palsy

Institution: Boston Children's Hospital

Abstract: Most common post-operative complications for CP patients are respiratory, surgical site and urinary tract infections.

Core Questions:

- Can a useful, reliable, and valid clinical risk prediction model for post-operative infection in children with CP undergoing hip or spine surgery be created using claims data, electronic health records?
- What are the risk factors for the development of post-operative infections?
- Will the addition of demographic, anthropometric, biomarkers improve the model?

Other Activities



In cooperation with the [Adaptive Sports Connection](#), The Pedal with Pete Foundation awarded three customized bicycles to Ohio children with cerebral palsy.
